Level 3 extended diploma media makeup and special effects assignment brief2: Progression AIMEE DIGBY

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introduction

- For this brief which is to think about progression routes, to complete and find work experience and to complete a UCAS application I am interested to see what other progression routes I could go down after finishing this course whether it is to become a freelance makeup artist or to further my education and knowledge in makeup and do the degree.
- Now the progression route I am thinking of going down is doing the degree at Bradford college.

Different progression routes traineeships

• As I am 18 years old there are many progression routes I could go down such as combing work and studying like doing a traineeship which is a course that offers work experience that gets you ready for an apprenticeship or a job. You do a traineeship for 6 weeks up to one year, the requirements to do this are be between 16 to 24 years old with an education and health plan and have nothing higher than a level 3 qualification.

Different progression routes – apprenticeships

 If I want to combine work and studying I could do a apprenticeship which is an intermediate or advanced higher, degree apprenticeships which combine both learning on the job and off the job learning, which means you get training relevant to your job and paid a salary. You spend 80% of the time in workplace and 20% in college, you do an apprenticeship for a year minimum. The entry requirements are dependent on the industry, job role and the apprenticeship level.

Different progression routes – University degree

• The progression route I could go down and I'm also interested in is doing a degree at university which means it is a high academic course taught in a higher education institute, i could be studying at university for three to four years, the entry requirements are set by each university, usually you need A levels or the equivalent qualifactions.

Different progression routes – higher technical skills courses

• Again, as I am 18 I could further my education and skills further before going straight into employment I could do a higher technical skills course, this means I can learn higher level skills that employers want in either a college or university for one to two years like the apprenticeship the entry requirements to do a higher technical skills course depends on the course.

Different progression routes – start a business

 If I didn't want to go down the route of combining work and study or continuing my education I could go straight to employment by starting my own business I could do this in a shared location or at home for this I may need special skills or qualification's and also start up cost to start a business.

Different progression routes – getting a job




What is work experience?

 Work experience in college gives students a chance to gain experience in your chosen career path to develop skills you don't already have, and it also allows students to see how things work in person and be able to have a hands-on experience in the career of their choice.

Where could I find work experience as a makeup artist?

 As a makeup artist I could find work experience by contacting salons who offer makeup as a service and see how salons offer makeup to clients, by doing makeup at makeup events such a college open day, or gain work experience by contacting makeup counters.

Previous work experience

- I have got previous work experience by doing my family and friends makeup for special events that they have attended; this is work experience as I had a time frame to apply the makeup and it was doing makeup on people who aren't in my class at college.
- I have also gained work experience by doing makeup for the college's performance of Grease which was a fast-paced environment as I had to apply the makeup and powder throughout the performance as the actors would sweat.
- I also have upcoming work experience which is doing the makeup for the college production of a Christmas carol. I also have been a makeup model for the Yazmin Heinz event hosted at college.

Work experience

For my work experience for my brief I helped out at the Bradford College open day which took place on Saturday 12th November, I did my mums makeup as a demo so I could practise on a mature face and a different skin type, for the open day I also set up a tea and coffee station for the models students were bringing in and also went out and bought milk and a Variety of biscuits. Overall I liked the work experience as I could practise and do a glowy skin and soft eye look on my mum to practise and trail doing mature skin. For the make up I really like how it turns out as the eyes are soft with a light and a dark brown blended into the crease to define and deepen it with a pale yellow shade in the inner third of the lid to brighten without using a shimmer as it would have been heavy for a day look. The skin I like as I prepped with a hydrating moisturiser primer hybrid to hydrate but primer her skin for makeup then I applied foundation with a fluffy foundation brush and a dewy foundation as it sits beautifully on my mums skin then I applied concealer and a liquid blush to her cheekbones but starting the liquid blush at the top of her cheekbones as it brings more attention to her eyes I applied powder and then all my powder products such as powder bronzer and blusher and a small bit of bigblighter. After I went hack to her bit of highlighter. After I went back to her eyes and applied a brown black to ger top lash line to act as a eyeliner. Then for her lips I applied a pinky purple lipstick.







Self-employment

 As a makeup artist you can choose to become selfemployed or a freelance makeup artist when you have finished building and developing your skills and a portfolio of your work. To do this you have to register to be selfemployed with HMRC or another limited company.

Starting out as a makeup artist

- For upcoming makeup artists building up a clientele can be difficult as there are already a lot of makeup artists out there.
- As a makeup artist I could try and get a job doing makeup in a salon and build up a clientele there, or because I have in interest in bridal makeup I could show my skills at wedding events/shows. I could even work as an assistant to an experienced makeup artist and build a network like that.

What insurance do I need as a makeup artist?

- As a makeup artist I will need to look at getting insurance to protect myself and my business from any accidents and other mishaps that could occur on the job, the insurance I will need to take a look at to get include:
- Public liability insurance I need this in case a client gets Injured, or their property gets damaged because of a makeup application e.g., dropping something that leaves a stain on the client's carpet.
- Professional indemnity insurance I need this if I give bad advice to a client and that causes a financial loss to my client.
- Tool cover I need this type of insurance if my specialist kit gets stolen, lost or damaged.
- Employer's liability insurance I will only need this type of insurance if I hire people to help me with my business.

What is a makeup artist?

- A makeup artist is someone who specializes in cosmetics, using technical skills and application to enhance someone's natural facial features or change them.
- They are often employed to do day to day makeup, for weddings and other special events, modelling shoots, theatre shows and tv shows.
- Even though makeup artists can work on theatre productions and on a tv set or another role in the industry it is common to become freelance makeup artist on a self employed basis.

How hard is it to become an MUA?

- If you have a passion for makeup and cosmetics and have an artistic flare or a talent for makeup It should not be difficult for you to make a portfolio of your work.
- On the other hand, becoming a successful makeup artist is hard as there is no set career path like there is for other industries and most makeup artists become selfemployed as building up a secure clientele and getting regular work takes skill and technical abilities, a lot of dedication and time.

How much do MUA's Make?

- As a freelance makeup artist if I decided to go down that route, I will be setting my own rates and the money I will get depends on these factors which are the type of makeup artist I am, where I am based and my experience.
- According to talent.com the average for a makeup artist is £39,000 this is a number taken from 52 salaries and is based on a employed role, however in 2021 the rate was £27,324.

What courses could I do?

- For being a makeup artist, you don't need a degree however getting recognized makeup MUA qualifications are a good starting point the most popular ones include: BTEC Level 3, VCTC Level 3, City and Guilds technical certificated and diplomas and Makeup standards Authority (MASA) diploma. These courses are offered by colleges, schools for creative arts and beauty academies.
- You could do more specific courses such as the one I do which is Media Makeup and Special Effects to push skills further I could attend masterclasses for particular technique's such as Contouring or Bridal makeup which are offered by salons, brands and makeup schools.
- If you wanted to do a degree course like I want to you have options like Hair and Makeup for fashion BA which I could study at London college of fashion or Makeup for Media and performance BA at Arts University Bournemouth.

What do I need to get accepted for makeup qualifications?

 For me to get on to a degree course anywhere, I will be doing an undergraduate course as I don't have a degree. To get onto a degree course, I will need a very strong portfolio of my work, as a makeup artist's portfolio is important for getting work and of course doing a degree course as it shows whoever is looking at the MUA's portfolio a wide range of what they can do and the skills they have eventually if you specialize in a part of the makeup industry you will then create a portfolio with looks and skills from the part of the industry you specialize in such as editorial.

Making a business plan

As an upcoming freelance makeup artist, it is a good idea
to have a plan for my business, so I have a clear plan for
what I want to achieve and how I will market my business.
I will also be doing SWOT analysis which stands for
strengths, weakness, opportunities and threats.


