


(LOOK 3:)




Inspo/artist research:



China dolls are the earliest porcelain dolls. They were made and became very popular in the 19th century. Today, they are considered collectors item. The most famous manufacturer of China dolls was Kestner, Conta & Boheme and Kling. They were sometimes made completely out of porcelain and sometimes the head and limbs out of other material. Most China dolls used to have a distinct hair style to be easily tell apart from their manufacturers. As fashion changed, so did their hairstyles so they can tell which people period the doll originates from.
