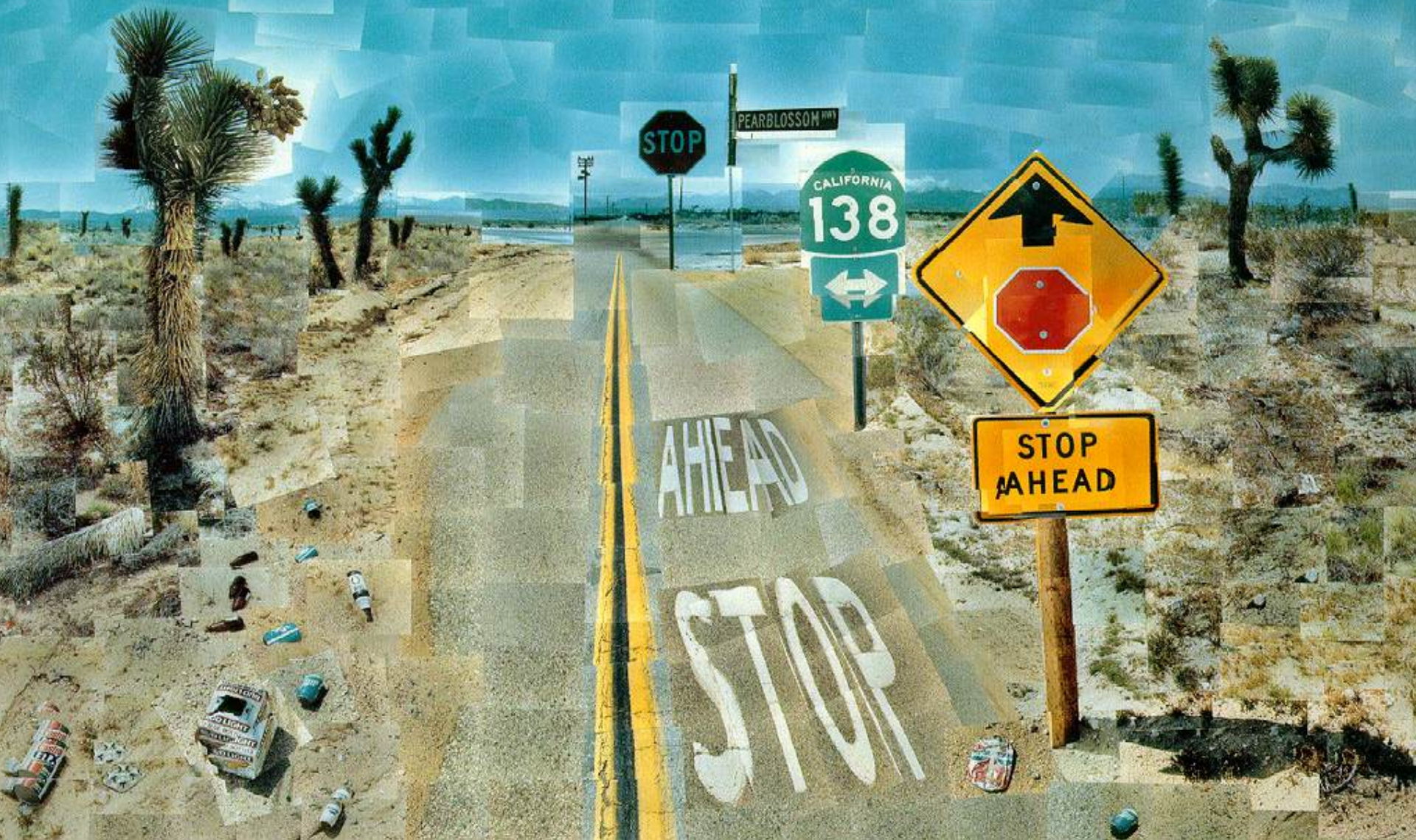

Q. What is photomontage?

A. A photomontage is a collage constructed from two or more photographs

What is a Joiner?

- In the early 1980s David Hockney began creating photo collages
 - He called them “joiners”
- Originally he used polaroid photographs
- He then switched to prints made from 35mm film

Generating images for a joiner

- You will be using **digital cameras** to generate imagery for your joiners
 - But you'll be creating the joiner in the 'old school' way using **hard copy prints**
- You can easily create these prints using the **Contact Sheet II** in Photoshop

How many images?

- For your first joiner you need to shoot 12-15 images in horizontal (landscape format)
- You can then print these to a suitable size for making an A3 size joiner

How to photograph for a joiner

- Stand in one place and don't move from it
- Take a series of images that overlap slightly
- Try and make sure you cover the whole scene
- Think about background, middle ground and foreground
- Try to maintain even lighting of your images by using a manual exposure setting
